The following letter is a detailed account of cat adoptions from the **spca cincinnati**. The adopter submitted the letter and requested that we publish it. She wanted all of our staff members to be aware of her gratitude. I hope you enjoy reading her story.

Greetings,

When I adopted Eostar, or EO, from the SPCA of Cincinnati in September 2001, he was a happy, spirited eight week old kitten. I soon realized that that he needed a feline pal, so I went back to the SPCA the following November to adopt his future partner in crime, Bijoux, another eight week old kitten. The day after I'd adopted Bijoux, the three of us moved into my first apartment together and felt like big cats just starting out our lives!

TO had a penchant for escaping the apartment and opening any cabinet or drawer (to make the contents disappear!) and thus had quickly earned the middle name of Houdini. Bijoux was originally named 'Bijou,' which is the French word for 'jewel.' It didn't take long for me to realize that she was far more priceless than just a single jewel, though, so before long, I had pluralized her name to Bijoux, meaning 'jewels.'

TO had once saved the lives of my family in the middle of the night by alerting me to four intruders trying to break in. Because of EO's fast thinking, my family had those few all-important seconds to prepare to defend ourselves and to call for help. When he wasn't busy fighting crime, though, he could usually be found rolling lazily about in the bathtub, his favorite haunt. He had an entire medley of songs about himself that I was required to sing to him every time he hopped into the tub (at least once daily!). For all of this swashbuckling charm, EO was really was quite the lover-he never knew a stranger and greeted everyone he'd ever met with the same wide, peaceful eyes.

And then there was Bijoux, my Queen Bee, who loved really only me. It's hard to quantify all of the myriad things that she did for me every day to keep my heart and spirit intact. When someone is busy being your best friend, you don't keep count, do you? You just feel grateful for every moment. I feel guilty though-saying that she was my 'best friend,' as though I'm playing favorites somehow, but to not honor her role in my life would be disrespectful. As well, she had the more difficult lesson about life to teach me: whereas EO had taught me how to love everybody, even- and especially-difficult people; Bijoux had taught me how to love myself.

From 2001 on, the three of us gypsies wandered about after that first apartment, living in about ten different dwellings- always the three of us Musketeers together. In 2013, I finally bought my first home in the foothills of the Ozarks, more than 600 miles from their birthplaces in Cincinnati. They lived out the rest of their lives here in the peaceful, wooded hills of a sleepy, little town in Arkansas.

EO passed away in his sleep in his favorite spot beneath a daybed back in August 2016, at the age of fifteen, with a strange, happy, all-knowing look on his face. That first night without him was during the Perseid comet showers, and so, I walked outside to stargaze- as I often do- and I was stunned to see in the stars for a split second- the same strange, happy, all-knowing expression that EO had on his face earlier that day. I must have imagined it, yes. Or maybe that was EO's last bit of magic for me... the magical Houdini that he always was. I laughed in spite of my tears to realize that he had finally 'escaped' for good.

I had just over a year more with Bijoux, and as she was encroaching upon her sixteenth birthday, I started teasing her about her being old enough to drive soon so that I could send her out on 'milk runs.' I think that both of us knew that our Earthly time together was coming to a close, though. That last summer together, I'd taken her in her carrier to a nearby creek for a bit of 'creek bed medicine.' She'd been pampered indoors her entire life (because she refused to go outside at all!), but she sat there that day by the creek in her open carrier, content to enjoy the healing energies of the water and the mountains in her tired, little bones. My Queen Bee passed away in my arms in the vet's office in October 2017, just after her sixteenth birthday.

I'm now to the point in my healing process wherein I'd like to reach out to the organization that had made it possible for these beautiful friends to enter my life. I wish to extend my thanks and gratitude to all who were working both behind the scenes and on the front lines of SPCA Cincinnati back in 2001, as well as to everyone who has continued since that time to do what must be done to place these beautiful animals into loving homes. When you think that you're not important, please remember on your hardest days that there might be someone like me fifteen or sixteen years down the line who will wish she knew your name.

When a beloved pet dies, he goes to this place where there is food and water and warm spring weather.


The old and frail animals are young again.

How much does a therapist visit cost?

The cost should be similar to what you'd pay for an office therapy visit, depending on your benefits, copay or coinsurance. You'll see what you owe before you start a visit and any cost is charged to your credit card. The cost is the same no matter when you have the visit — whether it's a weekday, the weekend, evening or a holiday.

How do I decide which therapist to see?

After you log in at **livehealthonline.com** or with the app, select **LiveHealth Online Psychology**. Next, you can read profiles of therapists and psychologists. Once you select the one you would like to see, schedule a visit online or by phone. At the end of the first visit, you can set up future visits with the same therapist if both of you feel it's needed. You always have the choice of the therapist you want to see.

What else do I need to know about LiveHealth Online Psychology?

- You must be at least 18 years old to see a therapist online and have your own LiveHealth Online account.
- Psychologists and therapists using LiveHealth Online do not prescribe medications.
